Family Resource Center offers support in a warm, welcoming space.

Families living in Scott County are invited to visit the Family Resource Center (FRC) in the Savage Public Library for information about community resources, referrals to service, and support. The FRC is staffed by a combination of County staff and community organizations who come together to provide various programming, services, and support to families. Other FRCs are located in Jordan and Shakopee. All services are free and confidential.

"All families need help sometimes," states Suzanne Arntson, Scott County Health and Human Services deputy director. "But, sometimes, families are unsure where to turn for help." The FRCs aim to increase accessibility within the community and break down barriers that make it hard for families to receive the best support possible. Having the FRC located at the Savage Library not only provides a safe and welcoming space, but it is also a convenient one-stop for families to be able to access a wide variety of programs and services that include:

- Assistance completing applications and paperwork
- Parenting skills, support, and mentorship
- Early literacy and education
- Health and wellness services
- Financial literacy classes
- Peer recovery support
- Housing consultation
- Legal information
- Economic Assistance Program support
- Domestic violence education and advocacy
- Cultural-specific service navigation and language access for LatinX and Somali communities

The Family Resource Center is in the Savage Public Library, 13090 Alabama Ave. It is open Thursdays from 1:30-4:30 p.m. So far in 2023, the FRC staff has helped support 70 local families, roughly five families per week. For more information, visit **scottcountymn.gov/frc**.

FREE steering wheel locks

Savage Police are distributing free steering wheel locks to owners of Kia and Hyundai vehicles with steel-key and turn-to-start ignitions, which have known defects that make them vulnerable to theft. All Kia and Hyundai models from 2011 to 2021 are affected. These defects do not impact push-to-start models. If your Hyundai or Kia uses a key to start your vehicle and not a push button, Savage Police Department has collaborated with Kia and Hyundai to offer FREE steering wheel locks to Savage residents. Welcome Jessica Koehn, Coordinated Responder

The Coordinated Response Program is officially underway! Meet Jessica Koehn, our new embedded social worker working with Savage Police. Jessica grew up in Savage and is a graduate of Burnsville High School. She is a licensed therapist and mental health professional with significant knowledge and experience working with families and the homeless population.

Jessica has hit the ground running. In just her first few weeks, she followed up on eight referrals and assisted officers with 29 interactions, providing counseling, referrals, and resources related to a variety of issues, including mental health concerns, addiction, domestic violence, homelessness assistance, and general parenting issues. "I get involved when an officer has concerns about a resident's

mental health," explains Koehn. "This could be during an active call or as a follow-up to a call. Either way, I make direct personal connections with individuals and families to help them with the challenges they

are struggling with. I ask lots of questions to understand better what is happening and why. Then I work collaboratively with that individual or family to come up with a plan on how to best support them." Sometimes that is connecting them with county services, helping them fill out paperwork, or just listening to them and letting them know they do not have to struggle alone. "This position provides an opportunity to offer greater support and service to individuals impacted by mental health issues," said Savage Police Chief Rodney Seurer. "The energy, expertise, and empathy Jessica brings to our department will significantly impact our community." The Coordinated Response Program was created using money from the 2022 Opiod Settlement.

Police invite the community to register video cameras

Do you have a video surveillance camera at your home or business? If so, Savage Police would like to work together to help keep our neighborhoods safe. Security cameras can be a great tool when solving crimes.

How SafeCam works

- Community members voluntarily share camera locations and footage, and Police create a list of these
- If a crime is committed, Police will reach out to people in the area who would be willing to share their camera footage
- Those community members can review their own footage and choose to share it with Police

What to know

- The SafeCam program is 100% voluntary.
- Any type of surveillance camera is helpful, including video doorbells, wireless video camera systems, and home security cameras.
- The police department never has direct access to community members' cameras or footage.
- Your personal information is confidential and will not be distributed except as required by law or court order.

Water Efficiency Rebate Program

Your in-lawn irrigation system, toilets, washing machine, or dishwasher could be wasting water and money. Thanks to a grant from the Metropolitan Council and funding through the Clean Water Land and Legacy Amendment, Savage residents can receive a credit on their water bill for replacing existing devices with specified water-efficient appliances purchased between June 2, 2022, through June 30, 2024. Rebates will be provided on a first-come, first-served basis until the grant money is gone.

Eligible Expenses

The rebate program is only available to property owners who are customers of the City of Savage's water supply system. Expenses eligible for the rebate include the out-of-pocket cost of the replacement devices, taxes not included. Eligible devices must be US EPA WaterSense labeled or DOE Energy Star rated. This program is intended to be a current infrastructure replacement program; new construction and new development are not eligible. Eligible rebates include:

- Toilets Must be EPA WaterSense labeled. Rebate maximum is \$100 per toilet, not to exceed 50% of the pre-tax purchase cost of each toilet.
- Washing Machines Must be US DOE Energy Star labeled.
 Rebate maximum is \$175 per washing machine.
- Dishwashers Must be US DOE Energy Star labeled. Rebate maximum is \$175 per dishwasher.
- Irrigation Controllers Must be EPA WaterSense labeled. Rebate maximum is \$200 per controller, not to exceed 90% of the pre-tax purchase cost.

How to apply

The rebate will appear as a credit on your water bill. To apply, residents must:

- Be connected to the City's water system.
- Purchase and install eligible devices between June 2, 2022, and June 30, 2024, or before grant money is gone.
- Fill out and submit an online application at cityofsavage.com.
- Include a photo/scan of the receipt/proof of purchase.
- Include a photo showing proof the device was installed.
- New construction, commercial, and homeowner associations do not qualify.
