Before disposing of medication, please:

- Leave the medicine in the original container
- Remove your name and personal information
- \bullet Keep the name of the medicine on the original container
- Drop the medication into the disposal box
- No needles/sharps/syringes are accepted at this location.

And remember, never flush medications down the toilet or drain.

Fire Prevention Week

October 8 - 14

Cooking safety starts with YOU!

Cooking brings family and friends together, provides an outlet for creativity, and can be relaxing. But did you know that cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries? By following a few safety tips, you can prevent these fires.

"Cook with Caution"

- Be on alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol, don't use the stove or stovetop.
- Stay in the kitchen while frying, boiling, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short time, turn off the stove.
- If you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, remain in the home while food is cooking, and use a timer to remind you that you are cooking.
- Keep anything that can catch fire oven mitts, wooden utensils, food packaging, towels, or curtains – away from your stovetop.

If you have a small (grease) cooking fire and decide to fight the fire...

- On the stovetop, smother the flames by sliding a lid over the pan and turning off the burner. Leave the pan covered until it is completely cooled.
- For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed.

If you have any doubt about fighting a small fire...

- Just get out! When you leave, close the door behind you to help contain the fire.
- Call 9-1-1 or the local emergency number from outside the home.



Just because it says it's flushable doesn't mean you should.


Just because you CAN flush things like wipes, band-aids, Q-tips, dental floss, makeup wipes, tissues, and cotton balls down the toilet, it doesn't mean you SHOULD flush them. The term "flushable" doesn't mean it's biodegradable. None of these items break down in the water and can tangle with other items, resulting in a clogged sewer line.

Good News!

City of Savage Communications Division wins national SAVVY awards.

The City of Savage Communications team has won two SAVVY Awards from the City-County Communications & Marketing Association (3CMA). The SAVVIES salute the best of the best in city, county, and agency communications. There were 38 categories and 875 entries. Buddy the Elf Fire Video won a 1st Place SAVVY. Changes in state law impact school resource officers.

The City of Savage and Savage Police have a strong relationship with the Prior Lake-Savage Area Schools (PLSAS) that has existed for many years. However, due to recent changes in state law, the Savage City Council and PLSAS agreed to end its 2023/2024 contract for a school resource officer (SRO) at Prior Lake-Savage High School in Savage. The Prior Lake Police Department provides SROs at Twin Oaks and Hidden Oaks middle schools.

The City is concerned about the liability the new use of force law puts on its SROs and contracted officers. School safety will remain a top priority, and the City of Savage and Savage Police are committed to working collaboratively with the school district to provide safety and security for students and staff this coming school year. "Savage police officers will continue to do regular patrols at the high school, and we will have a presence at events like football games," reassures Police Chief Rodney Seurer. "They just will not work directly under contract with the school district." In addition, an officer will be assigned to investigate issues as warranted at the school. "Our SRO Jacque Kelch is fantastic and is both a mentor and a resource for many students," states City Administrator Brad Larson. "Our hope and intent is to re-instate the school resource officer position in the future if the law is changed."

We are Naturally Resourceful.

Fall street sweeping

Twice a year, Public Works crews sweep all 132 miles of residential streets (264 if you count both sides of the road) - to keep our neighborhoods clean and livable and protect our waterways. It takes approximately 4 -6 weeks to get the entire city swept, including parking lots and hard surfaces. Everything that lands in the streets eventually



travels through the storm drainage system to lakes and ponds. Remember that leaves and grass should stay in your yard and not be raked or placed on the streets. They can clog storm drains and pollute our ponds, streams, and wetlands.

Keep leaves out of our streets

We have all probably observed someone who decided to clear their lawn by blowing leaves or grass clippings into the street rather than bagging and throwing them away. While blowing leaves into the street gets them out of your yard, they eventually end up somewhere, like in storm sewer drains, where they get carried away to nearby ponds and streams. Leaves and grass clippings, and other yard waste contain phosphorus and other nutrients that feed algae. Leaves and grass clippings can also lead to blocked storm drains that cause flooding.

SMSC Free Yard Waste Recycling is back

What do you do with all those leaves? During October, Savage residents can again dispose of yard waste free of charge on Sundays from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the SMSC Organics Recycling Facility at 1905 Mystic Lake Drive South, Shakopee. Items accepted at no charge include leaves, grass clippings, brush and logs, mulch, and grass clippings. Must show I.D.; arrive early to ensure entry. For more information, visit smscorf.com.

I want to know! What's going on with the storm ponds by Lifetime?

The City is installing a unique irrigation system at Community Park that will reuse stormwater pumped from nearby Twin Lakes to irrigate the pinwheel ballfields and the two fields along CR 27. First, the water will be pumped from the Twin Lakes into the storm ponds by Lifetime, and then, a lift station will pump the water to Community Park. Right now, crews are cleaning out the storm ponds to get rid of built-up sediment and make the ponds larger. This reuse system will save water and reduce runoff from going into the Credit River, improving the river's water quality and protecting our resources. Now you know!

Dead-end flushing scheduled through October

Public Works Utility Services crews are conducting annual flushing of water mains serving cul-de-sacs and dead-end streets throughout the city. This is done as preventative maintenance to ensure high water quality across the system. During the flushing period, it is normal to experience some discolored water. This does not affect the safety of the water, and your water is safe to drink.
