Parks and Recreation Master Plan Approved!

Last September, the City of Savage began a 14-month-long process of developing a new Parks and Recreation Master Plan. This plan aimed to establish a clear, 20-year vision for the Savage parks, trails, recreation, and open space systems based on anticipated demographics and economic and social changes over the next 20 years. The master plan will be the guiding document that identifies long-term



infrastructure and recreational improvements so people of all ages, abilities, and cultural backgrounds feel welcome and represented in our park system.

Throughout the process, extensive community engagement through the City's online engagement platform Let's Talk Savage, pop-up workshops, community meetings, and community outreach events were used to gather input on the community's vision for our city park system. "Through this process, we learned a lot," stated Public Works/ Parks and Recreation Director Greg Boatman. "We learned what our parks have been, what they are currently, what we need them to be, and how to achieve the desired outcome."

Next steps

The Savage City Council adopted the Parks Master Plan on November 6, 2023. Now, staff will develop an implementation plan, including funding opportunities and high-level cost estimates to address park improvements, programming, partnerships, staffing, maintenance, policies, and procedure recommendations. Kevin joined Savage Fire on September 11, 2023 as a full-time firefighter. "Kevin has a wealth of experience and a genuine passion for excellence that perfectly aligns with our department's core values," states Fire Chief Bresnahan.

How long have you been a Savage firefighter?

I have been a firefighter for 13 years. During those 13 years, I have worked for the Shakopee Fire Dept., where I was promoted to Lieutenant and then to Captain, and I have worked for the Fridley Fire Dept. as an experienced part-time firefighter, where I worked scheduled shifts. I also worked for Rural Metro Fire as a contracted firefighter at the Pine Bend Refinery, where I performed scheduled inspections and maintenance on fire suppression equipment and provided training to other departments on Class B firefighting techniques.

What made you want to become a firefighter?

As a child, I was fortunate to grow up in the firehouse. My father was a volunteer firefighter for the City of Shakopee, and the memories of the camaraderie and the selfless acts that those men put into every call inspired me to join the fire service. I enjoy responding to every call and being able to lend a helping hand to mitigate any issue that we have been called to.

What do you like to do when you are not working?

I enjoy spending time with my family and friends. You will often find me outside working on projects or at a cabin enjoying the Minnesota wilderness.

What do you like most about firefighting?

I enjoy the interactions with the community, whether it's a call for help, a public event we have been asked to attend, or just stopping and visiting with some kids who are excited to see us. I also enjoy training others for the hazards we will or could potentially be called to.

What would you say to someone considering becoming a firefighter?

I would say do it! This job is like no other; the connections you build with the community you serve and other firefighters are unique. You will never second guess your decision to join once you do. You will be joining a big family that is supportive and caring every day, and they want to make you successful.

We're ready for winter!

Another snow season is upon us, and the City of Savage Plow Pros are ready! At any given time, up to 20+ plow operators from streets, fleet, parks, and utility divisions work together to clear the snow throughout the City. Here are a few tips from our Plow Pros that will help them do their job quickly and effectively to safely get you on the road.

Tip 1: Move parked cars off the street.

Many times, city plows hit the streets around 2 a.m. You can help the City plow more quickly and efficiently by moving parked cars off the street. Cars parked on the street make it difficult for plow operators to see and prevent clearing the road from curb to curb. Winter parking restrictions are in effect now through March 31. During this time, on-street parking is prohibited between 2 and 6 a.m., even if there is no snow on the ground. Violators may be ticketed or towed. Temporary variances may be requested through the Savage Police Department at 952-882-2600.

Tip 2: Keep garbage cans in your driveway.

This winter, think about where you put your garbage and recycling bins. Our snowplow crews rely on your help to place garbage and recycling cans at the end of the driveway behind the curb on trash pick-up days. Bins placed in the street are tough to plow around and may result in the road not being completely plowed to the curb. We appreciate your cooperation!

Tip 3: Give snowplow drivers plenty of room.

Please allow plenty of room between your vehicle and a plow. A "snow cloud" is often thrown up when plowing, limiting visibility on all sides of the truck, especially regarding what's behind the plow. So stay back at least ten car lengths and never pass a plow when it's plowing.

Tip 4: Be patient.

The bottom line is that our snowplow crew does their best to keep our roads clear and safe. They often work long hours and are called away from their families on evenings, weekends, and holidays. Every storm is different, but the goal for each one is to provide timely and effective services. They appreciate your patience and cooperation.

Enjoy the snowmobiling season; just know the rules.

Trails will be open December 1 through March 31 but may be closed due to limited snowfall

The City of Savage allows for the peaceful and safe operation of snowmobiles within the city limits, but riders must obey all traffic rules, regulations, and traffic control devices. Here are a few tips to help riders have an enjoyable season:

- Ride only on designated trails. The Savage Sno-Pacers is a
 volunteer group that helps maintain more than 24 miles of trails
 in Savage. These trails provide local riders access to regional
 and state trails. Riders are required to follow the marked trails
 within the City except for access from their residence to the
 nearest marked trails.
- Be respectful, and don't ride after 11 p.m. or before 7 a.m.
- Access trails by taking the most direct route possible from your home base. Violators could be cited and/or have their snowmobile impounded.
- Obey posted speed limits and don't operate at high speeds (over 15 mph) when near houses.
- Be alert, don't drink and drive, and dress properly.

Shake the habit!

Salt helps keep our roads, driveways, and sidewalks safer in slippery weather, but our salt habit is bad for the health of our streams, rivers, and lakes. More salt does not equal more melting. Here are a few tips and tricks you can do to shake the salt habit:



- 1. Shovel first, then apply salt only if necessary.
- 2. Don't apply salt when the temperature is below 15 degreesit's ineffective.
- 3. A little salt goes a long way. One coffee mug full of salt is enough for ten sidewalk squares or a 12 X 20-foot driveway.
- 4. Give it time to work. The colder it is, the longer it takes salt to work.
- 5. When the ice has melted, sweep up an excess salt and save it to reuse or throw it in the trash.

Help our City Represent Everyone Apply to be on a Commission

Each year, the City Council appoints commissioners to serve in important volunteer roles for the City. Our goal is to have our commissions reflect the wide range of backgrounds and diverse perspectives that make up our community.

Who are commissioners, and what do they do?

Commissioners are volunteers who care about the quality of life in Savage and the programs and services that the City provides. They review and discuss important policies, procedures, and initiatives and make recommendations to the City Council.

What types of Commissions are in the City of Savage?

The City has four commissions:

Economic Development Commission (EDC)

meets third Wednesday at 7:15 a.m.

The EDC advises the City Council in all matters relating to the community's economic development, including efforts to recruit new businesses and industries, retention and expansion of existing businesses and industries, and diversification of the community's economy.

Parks, Recreation and Natural Resources Commission (PRNRC) meets fourth Monday at 7 p.m.

The PRNRC works with staff to provide input and make recommendations regarding recreational programming and the acquisition and development of parks.

Planning Commission (PC)

Meets Thursdays after Council meetings at 7 p.m.

The Planning Commission focuses on land use and zoning issues within the City limits.

Community Equity Commission (CEC)

Meets second or third Thursday at 6 p.m.

The CEC advises the City Council on diversity, equity, and inclusion strategies that strengthen relationships among historically underrepresented populations in local government and uses an equity lens to review city practices, policies, and procedures to provide recommendations to the City Council.

Who can serve as a commissioner?

Anyone who is a resident of Savage and interested in serving the City can serve as a commissioner. The City also encourages junior and senior high school students interested in learning more about local government to apply. EDC Commissioners must either live in Savage or own a business in Savage.

Open Walk/Jog | FREE
