School's Open: Drive carefully

As summer winds down and students return to school, it's an excellent time to remind drivers to slow down and watch for kids and school buses. Sometimes, drivers are unclear about whether or not to stop when sharing the road with school buses.

School bus pre-warning signals:

- The flashing amber lights warn drivers that the school bus is preparing to load or unload students. When you see the flashing yellow lights, be extra alert for children in the area and be ready to stop.
- Do not speed up to pass the school bus before the bus driver displays the red lights and stop sign.

School bus red lights and stop arm:

- When the school bus is stopped with its flashing red lights activated and its stop arm extended, traffic from both directions must stop at least 20 feet away from the bus
- You must remain stopped until the stop arm is retracted and the red lights are no longer flashing.

When don't you need to stop?

The only time motorists are not required to stop for a school bus with its red lights flashing is when the bus is on a separate roadway. A good example of this is if there is a median present. You could be charged with a gross misdemeanor if you pass a school bus on the right side while the stop arm is extended or the red lights are activated.

Know the Code: Leash Law

Like most cities, Savage has a leash law. Your dogs and cats must be restrained on a leash when off your property or in a public space like a city park or trail. Any pets found running at large will be taken to Four Paws Animal Control. Here are the top 3 reasons why we need residents to follow the leash law:

- 1. They keep public spaces safe and welcoming for everyone. Leash laws exist to keep all of us safe -- including our pets. No one can truly predict how their pet will react when greeting others. No matter how well-trained, circumstances might arise that trigger fear or aggression in your pet. Help avert disaster by keeping your pet on a leash when off your property.
- 2. Loose pets give pet owners a bad name. Not everyone likes dogs or loves cats. A dog or cat on a leash shows others that you are in control of your pet. It also shows that you respect those who wish to keep their distance from your pet.
- 3. Scoop the poop. Unleashed pets eliminate at will. If you don't pick up their waste, it is more than just smelly and unsightly. It pollutes our water and poses a health risk for pets and people. Please help keep our shoes, trails, and waterways clean -- pick up your pet's waste and dispose of it in the garbage. #scoopthepoop

On a mission to keep our streets safe

Speeders and texting drivers, beware. That innocent-looking black Ford Explorer you're about to blow past just might be the law.



Officer Crain is on a mission to keep the streets in our community safe. For the second consecutive year, the Savage Police Department was awarded a Traffic Safety Officer (TSO) grant from the Minnesota Department of Public Safety. This grant fully funds our dedicated Traffic Safety Officer, Adam Crain, who focuses on looking for impaired driving, speeding, and distracted driving. To help him be more effective in his mission, Officer Crain will now drive around in an unmarked black Ford Explorer. "This is not about being sneaky," says Police Chief Brady Juell. "This is about trying to change people's habits and having them pay attention to their driving even when they don't think a police officer is watching."

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More departments are putting unmarked patrol cars on the road because they can be a very effective tool to identify violations such as texting and driving, no seat belt use, and other unsafe operations. "We see a lot of driving violations, particularly on County Road 42," explains Officer Crain. "Driving around in a squad that blends in more with traffic will help me identify people not practicing safe behaviors, stop them, and address the behaviors. Drivers who do follow the rules of the road needn't worry!"

In 2023, Officer Crain made 93 DUI arrests; about 25% were impaired by a substance other than alcohol. With the help of his fellow officers, the total of DUIs last year was 212. "I think about all the lives impacted by someone's bad decision," reflects Crain. "You can never really know how many lives were saved by taking an impaired driver off the road, but I know I am making a difference." His advice: You can avoid a ticket and a crash if you simply buckle up, drive safe speeds, pay attention, and always drive sober. Help us keep our community roads safe.

Did you know?

Did you know there are nearly 300 neighborhood cul-de-sacs in Savage? Living in a cul-de-sac includes less traffic, less noise, and a greater sense of community for residents as they can see their neighbors' front doors from their own. Our City requires that cul-de-sacs include islands that are not just for storing plowed snow. They also reduce stormwater run-off and provide a more attractive view for homes facing the cul-de-sac. When a neighborhood with cul-de-sacs is developed, the City requires the developer to finish the islands with decorative landscapes, trees, and hardy plants and shrubs. If the neighborhood has a Homeowner Association (HOA), the HOA may be responsible for maintaining this common area by watering, pruning, and replacing dead plantings. If the neighborhood does not have an HOA, the property owners surrounding the island are responsible for the ongoing maintenance and upkeep. Neighbors often organize themselves to care for the cul-de-sac as a natural outgrowth of a sense of community. Now you know!



City of Savage is recognized for its ongoing dedication to sustainability.
