### **2024 Election Information**

You may have heard that we have kind of a big deal election coming up on November 5. In fact, absentee voting (AB) has already started! Here's a rundown of what you need to know.

## Make sure you are registered to vote.

If you're not registered, save time at the polls and register online at **mnvotes.org**. You can register on the day of the election at your precinct; make sure to bring your ID with your current address or an ID and a utility bill with the current address.

#### What's on the ballot?

View a sample ballot, search for candidate filings, and learn more at **mnvotes.org**. The sample ballot shows a list of the candidates and ballot questions you'll be voting on. Information is posted about 45 days before an election.

#### How and where to vote.

#### Vote early by mail

To vote by mail, apply for an absentee ballot to be mailed to you at **mnvotes.org**. Ballots are mailed out through October 22, and you should allow a week for delivery.

- Ballots should be mailed back or delivered to the Scott County Government Center/Elections Division. They must be received by 8 p.m. on Election Day.
- Beginning September 24, you can drop off your ballot at a drop box at Savage City Hall, 6000 McColl Driver, Monday
   Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Note: No ballots will be accepted during the 11 a.m. - 12 noon lunch break.

#### Vote early in person

Beginning September 20, you can vote early in person at Savage City Hall Monday - Friday, 8 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Voters will be asked to complete an absentee ballot application, mark their ballot, and seal it in an AB secrecy envelope.

 Beginning October 18, in-person voters will complete their AB application, mark their ballot, and feed it directly into the ballot tabulator.

- Extended absentee voting hours will be offered:
  - Saturday, October 26 and November 2: 9 a.m. 3 p.m.
  - Tuesday, October 29: 8 a.m. 7 p.m.
  - Sunday, November 3: 9 a.m. 3 p.m.
  - Monday, November 4: 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Track the status of your ballot or confirm that it was received and accepted at **mnvotes.org**.

#### **Election Day Voting**

The City of Savage has nine polling locations open on Election Day, November 5, from 7 a.m. - 8 p.m. You must vote in the precinct where you legally reside.

As we enter election season, please remember to follow city and state laws regarding campaign signs:

- Only place signs on private property with the permission of the property owner.
- Keep signs out of the City's right-of-way, the "sight triangle," and at least 100 feet from a polling location.
- Remove all campaign signs by November 15.
- The City has the right to remove any sign that violates city or state laws.

### We are Naturally Resourceful



#### There's a new trash truck in town.

Savage Public Works has a new compacting garbage truck that makes emptying garbage containers in our parks more efficient. In the past, seasonal workers could only collect garbage from a few parks at a time before the truck was full. Now, the new garbage truck compacts the trash as it's picked up, which cuts down on trips back to Public Works to dump it. With 24 parks and 100+ trash cans to empty every 3-5 days, that's a huge time-saver!

#### Keep leaves out of our streets.

We have all probably observed someone who decided to clear their lawn by blowing leaves or grass clippings into the street rather than bagging and throwing them away. While blowing leaves into the street gets them out of your yard, they eventually end up somewhere, like in storm sewer drains, where they get carried away to nearby ponds and streams. Leaves, grass clippings, and other yard waste contain phosphorus and other nutrients that feed algae. Leaves and grass clippings can also lead to blocked storm drains that cause flooding.

## **Collector street speed limit evaluation**

#### Learn more and share your input.

Effective August 1, 2019, Minnesota cities have the authority to set speed limits on streets they control if a speed limit policy is in place. We know speeding is a common concern of residents, so the City is taking this opportunity to review existing speed limits on collector streets to provide safe travel for all modes of mobility. The current speed limit on local residential streets is set at 30 mph, however, the speed limit on collector streets is inconsistent.

#### **Public Open House**

## Growing healthy food and a sense of community.

In 2022, the City identified the demand for community garden space far exceeded the current availability, so our Parks and Recreation Department was excited to create a new community garden. They identified space at Warren Butler Park in downtown Savage and created 44 new garden plots for the upcoming growing season. The City partnered with Scott County Public Health to apply for a Statewide Health Improvement Partnership (SHIP) grant to cover the garden's cost. The City saw this community garden as more than a place to grow vegetables and flowers; it was also an opportunity to create a community gathering space connecting people and cultivating a sense of community. Plots were available on a first-come basis and were quickly sold out.

Last year, a few city staff thought it would be nice to create a small garden in an unused planting bed behind City Hall. They purchased all the materials and plants and then shared all the produce as it ripened in the staff breakroom. "It always seemed to go home with someone," shared Natural Resource Technician Jonah Reyes.

This year, additional SHIP grant money has helped expand the community garden program to a second garden at River Bend Park. As part of the City's response to addressing safety in our parks, the City added 30 new garden plots at River Bend Park to intentionally bring more adults and programming to the park. Also, thanks to SHIP, city staff planted not just one but two gardens to grow a variety of produce to share. The garden in the back of City Hall was significantly improved, and two additional raised bed gardens were added at Fire Station #1. The grant covered 100% of the cost of fencing, trellis materials, vegetables, and a hose for watering. The reception from staff has been incredible - from volunteering to plant and weed, installing compost, scheduling watering, and, of course, enjoying the fruits of their labor. "The staff gardens have allowed people to experience gardening and enjoy the benefits of fresh vegetables they can eat during lunch or at home, stated Reyes. "The gardens have really created a camaraderie amongst the staff at both locations." Community gardening is a way to engage in physical activity, grow healthy fruits and vegetables, learn a new hobby, beautify our parks, and strengthen social connections for both our residents and staff.

## Creek Hill Park is coming soon!

We are excited to announce our newest neighborhood park in south Savage will be named Creek Hill Park. Creek Hill Park will be a 2.17-acre park at the southeast corner of 156th and Hampshire Ave., featuring playground equipment, a picnic shelter, a walking path, and open green space. Some existing trees need to be removed due to disease or poor condition, but most of the site's unique apple trees will be preserved and maintained as a special park feature.



#### Did you know?

The City's policy is to name parks at the time of development. Thank you to everyone who participated in the Help Name Our Park project on Let's Talk Savage. We had 40 contributors and 28 names submitted. In July, all the name submissions that fit the naming policy criteria were presented to the Parks, Recreation, and Natural Resources Commission (PRNRC). The PRNRC discussed each submission and agreed that Creek Hill Park was the name of choice to recommend to the Council. On August 19, staff brought the recommendation to the Council for final approval.

#### **More input**

The new park site plan has been approved, and construction will begin soon. The playground equipment selection process will include input from the community. See all the name submissions and follow this project for updates and opportunities to share your ideas at letstalksavage.com.
