Election Day is November 5

Vote in-person.

The City of Savage has nine polling locations open on Election Day from 7 a.m. – 8 p.m. You must vote in the precinct where you legally reside. If you're in line at 8 p.m., you're allowed to vote. Find your precinct and polling location at **mnvotes.org**.

Register to vote

Voters must be registered using their current name and address. Voters who have moved or changed their name since the last election must update their registration. You can register or update your registration when you vote either at your polling location on Election Day or when voting early at City Hall; however, registering online before Election Day is encouraged. Community leaders "feel the heat"

On a recent Saturday morning, mayors, city council members, city managers, and other community leaders from Scott County got to become firefighters for a day. They geared up in 60 pounds of turnout gear and air tanks to participate in the first-ever Feel the Heat event, a hands-on interactive training designed to educate decision-makers on the realities and risks of being a firefighter.

As Minnesota transitions to more full-time fire departments, it is necessary to educate how these departments operate and the service they provide. Like citizen academies hosted by police departments, Feel the Heat was intended to enhance community leaders' awareness of what it takes to work for the fire department and why sufficient funding and equipment matter. Throughout the training, participants faced a series of realistic scenarios that a firefighter might encounter on any given day, including a live fire, rescuing a victim from a smoke-filled structure, a vehicle extrication, and performing resuscitation skills on a victim of cardiac arrest to highlight the importance of firefighter training, equipment, and resources.

"Our goal was to provide elected officials with the perspective of how crews operate, what it takes to respond, and the time-critical, labor-intensive, highly technical nature of the job," stated Savage Fire Chief Jeremie Bresnahan.

Participants walked away hot, sweaty, and tired, with a greater appreciation for what firefighters and emergency responders do to keep our communities safe every day. "It was very eye-opening to put on all the equipment, breathe through a mask, and try to put out a fire or crawl through a building, "commented Savage City Administrator Brad Larson. "I think this training gives decision-makers in Scott County a much more insightful perspective on how and why firefighters train the way they do."

This event was hosted by Belle Plaine Fire, Jordan Fire, Mdewakanton Sioux Community Fire, Prior Lake Fire, and Savage Fire.

Things to know about the 2025 Proposed City Budget

Each year, the City Council approves a budget for day-to-day operations, capital projects like roads, vehicles, equipment, etc., and annual debt repayment. These funds ensure that residents, businesses, and visitors receive quality services at a good value. The 2025 proposed General Fund budget is \$24.5 M. (The 2024 General Fund budget was \$22.73 M).


The budget process

The budgeting starts in July, with staff engaging in a comprehensive budget process to determine the costs of the services we provide. Based on guidance from the Council, departments were instructed to limit increases to 0.5% or less and include only necessary and unavoidable expenses to maintain current service levels—any new expense requests needed to support city council directives or strategic plan action items.

Did you know? Roughly 70% of the City's general fund budget is personnel costs.

2025 budget priorities

The most significant portion of the budget increase - \$1.4M - is for city employees' wages and benefits.



Annual COLA and Compensation Study

One of our 2022-2025 Strategic Priorities is to attract and retain a high-quality workforce. The 2025 proposed General Fund budget includes \$371,000 for annual cost of living increases (COLA) and \$260,000 for employee wage increases, as a recent compensation and benefit study recommended. While wages are certainly not the only part of a successful recruitment and retention strategy, ensuring wages are competitive helps keep good workers and shows support for our dedicated staff. "Our goal is to ensure that our employees are paid competitively and fairly," states City Administrator Brad Larson. "That way, we can continue to keep them, and when it comes time to fill positions, we can recruit appropriately."


Addition of three full-time firefighters

The 2023 Standards of Coverage report identified the need to increase minimum staffing levels. The part-time firefighter model is proving increasingly unsustainable due to ongoing recruitment and retention challenges. These challenges limit our ability to maintain an effective response force and ensure the safety of firefighters and the community. To address this, the proposed 2025 budget allocates approximately \$430,000 to hire three additional full-time firefighters, raising the total to 12. With this staffing increase, the department will operate three shifts, each consisting of one captain and three firefighters, ensuring better coverage and a more effective response team. Fire Chief Bresnahan states, "At the current staffing level, we deploy two-person crews to calls, but overlapping calls or situations requiring more personnel compromise safety and service quality. Adding one more full-time firefighter per shift will help us better manage multiple calls at once, reducing reliance on part-time staff and improving our ability to respond quickly and safely."

Did you know? Approximately 50% of the City's budget supports local public safety services.


How is your money spent?

Proposed 2025 Property Tax

When you get your property tax bill, keep in mind that your bill includes taxes from several jurisdictions, not just the City. Roughly 1/3 of the typical Savage residential tax bill goes to the City of Savage. The remaining taxes go to your school district, Scott County, and other special taxing districts such as watersheds, transit, mosquito control, etc.

Per direction from the Council, staff will continue to fine-tune the budget and levy to hold down taxes to the minimum necessary to provide high-quality city services. Residents are invited to attend the upcoming City Council meetings:

December 2: Truth-In Taxation Public Hearing at 7 p.m. in the Council Chambers. Public comments are welcome at this time.

December 16: The 2025 final budget and tax levy are scheduled to be adopted by the City Council at 7 p.m.

These trees will be marked with an "X" and removed at no cost to the resident/property owner. In accordance to the City's EAB Management Plan, trees will only be replaced in parks and open spaces.
